TO THE ELECTORS.

Ladies and Gentlemen,

Having, at the request of several influential ratepayers, allowed my name to go forward as a Candidate for a seat on the Urban District Council, I shall be grateful for your interest and vote on MONDAY NEXT.

My policy (if elected) will be to advocate the steady and economic progress and improvement of the town, or the much larger area that it may become in the near future, but bearing in mind that all expenditure on improvements must be kept within reasonable limits, and that no extraordinary demand is made on the pockets of the ratepayers.

HOUSING.—There is still a serious shortage, and I am prepared to support further schemes to the full ; houses for all at a reasonable rental it is hoped will mean the ultimate clearance of slum property.

AMALGAMATION.—My aim will be to ensure that Uxbridge is made the real and vital centre of the rapidly growing district around us, both from the residential, industrial and business point of view. I am certain that the town and district under one authority will ultimately be of the greatest benefit to all.

Other important questions such as Public Services, Children's Welfare Centre, etc., will receive my attention and deliberation, the valuable work of the latter is becoming daily more manifest, and it should be given all the material assistance possible.

I pledge myself to study and further the interests of the ratepayers generally, to view each scheme with an open mind, and judge its merits accordingly, with the hope that the town can thus be made a better one for ALL to live in.
